COVER STORY Ilex verticillata

Winterberry (*Ilex verticillata*) also called Michigan holly, is a deciduous multi-stemmed shrub rather than an evergreen tree. Native to the eastern two-thirds of the United States and lower Canada, Winterberry can be found in swamps, marshes, river beds and coastal plains.

Like all members of the holly family, it needs a male and female plant to produce berries on the female. One male bush will service three to five females. Depending on the cultivar, it grows 3' to 12' high and wide depending on the cultivar. Plant in full to partial sun and provide moderate moisture. It is also very adaptable to drier conditions. It is hardy from Zones 4 to 8. Prune to shape in early spring just before new growth appears. No serious insect or disease problems, but does gets leaf spot and powdery mildew

Winterberry blooms in June and July; and in late summer produces clumps of bright red fruit, contrasting against dark green foliage. The fruits produced on this shrub are not a preferred food for songbirds, but persist on the branches into late winter and are thus available when other foods are scarce, offering food for mockingbirds, robins, waxwings and other fruit eaters.

The foliage is on the menu for woolly bear caterpillars. Winterberry is a beautiful addition to your yard.



GCFM MEETINGS: Answers to Your Frequently Asked Questions

A number of people have raised questions about attending the GCFM Annual Meeting and Fall Conference, as well as GCFM District Annual Meetings. Here are s few answers that hopefully you will find helpful:

Q: Why does the GCFM hold these meetings?

A: Two reasons:

Education/Inspiration: The Annual (June) and Fall Meetings are the primary ways the GCFM disseminates information to our club members on key topics such as horticulture, floral design, landscape design, and environmental concerns. We typically hire nationally-recognized speakers to share current thinking on one or more of these topics. Meetings also enable us to share what clubs are doing in these important areas through brief case studies on recent club projects or awards.

<u>Recognition:</u> These meetings also provide a platform for the Federation to recognize and celebrate clubs for their excellent hard work through State, Regional and National Awards.

Q: Who should attend?

A: Meetings are open to all club members, not just officers. Attendance is not mandatory, but it is our hope that every club will send a representative to take part in the educational activities and carry the information back to other members. In the case of larger clubs with many members who are employed, a GCFM liaison is sometimes appointed who is free during daytime hours to represent the club.

Q: How do clubs hear about these meetings?

A: The Federation sends personal invitations to clubs receiving awards or celebrating anniversaries. We email all club presidents a Call to Meeting, which hopefully they share with membership.

Q: How do clubs handle the cost of meeting attendance?

A: Policies vary:

Some clubs budget in advance for 1-2 members to attend some or all of the meetings: GCFM Annual Meeting, GCFM Fall Conference, and GCFM District Annual Meeting. If there is no budget, club members can vote to approve the cost.

One of our clubs currently budgets for two members to attend. If more members want to participate, the club shares the cost with them 50/50.

Other clubs ask members to submit their own reservation and payment but then reimburses either all or part of the cost.

Q: How does the GCFM determine the cost to club members?

The Federation continues to work hard to hold down the cost of meetings, which has increased steadily over the years. The use of multiple specialized staff add to the cost of the basic space. Speaker costs, floral materials for design demonstrations and centerpieces also add up. To minimize the portion of costs that is passed along to attendees, we hold Opportunity Drawings and charge vendors (Continued on page 19)

Fall is Here, Bringing Leaves and Elections

Leaves

Fall reliably brings the cascading of deciduous leaves, year after year, with the perennial challenge of handling them. Leaving them whole on lawns and planting beds can smother plants and damage lawns, so what is the best way to handle them? First of all, it may help to have a bit of an attitude adjustment....this is not a burden to be dealt with grudgingly, but a gift of nature's bounty delivered within our reach! Composted by you as the "brown" material along with "green" material such as kitchen scraps and grass clippings, leaves turn into a rich material that adds humus, microorganisms and nutrients to your lawn and gardens. I also now broadcast compost on my lawn in early July after I was told it discourages Japanese beetles from laying their eggs....that hatch later as grubs! The story goes that the beetles do not seem to like compost and go elsewhere.

Rather than composting your leaves, you might want to try shredding them. Shredding leaves with a mulching mower and applying the shred as a mulch to flower and shrub borders is a wonderful way to enrich the soil. I just ask my lawn mowing company to run the mower over a pile of leaves with the bag attached then I spread the shred around my beds. You can also save extra shred in bins or bags to use in your compost pile/bin over the winter or next season.

If you do not have a lot of leaves, consider running the mulching mower over the leaves on the lawn without the bag attachment, leaving the cut-up leaves in place...they will decompose over the winter and be incorporated into the soil... what a boon for the lawn! All this added texture helps the lawn retain moisture during dry weather, as well as adding nutrients and microorganisms.

If you prefer not to do any of the above suggestions, send the leaves to your town's composting area....many MA towns now operate such areas. It is important to avoid sending leaves to landfills or incinerators....the former is a waste of valuable landfill space, and the latter releases CO2 into the atmosphere and adds to global warming.

Elections

Speaking of global warming, that takes me to the Elections part of this article. As important as it is for all of us to do our individual part to compost, to recycle, to garden organically, to insulate our homes, to drive high mpg vehicles, and the many other individual actions we can take, it is even <u>more</u> important how we vote in elections! Who we elect to make state-wide and national environmental decisions have far-reaching consequences beyond what we as individuals can accomplish alone. It is important to find out the environmental positions and voting records of all candidates. Of course, this might not be the only issue of

importance to you, but I am making a pitch for this issue to move up on your list of priorities....if we do not address climate change assertively now, it will only make other issues more severe. For example, if you are concerned about budget deficits, global warming is making droughts, wild fires, and flooding much more damaging and costly, eating in to budgets. If you are concerned about the aging infrastructure in the US, increased spending needed after more severe storms due to global warming will mean less money to fix infrastructure. If you are concerned about asthma and Lyme disease, global warming is increasing the incidence and severity of these health issues, to name just two. Severe heat is killing people in India as I write this article in July as it did several years ago in France!

I am including a link to the <u>non-partisan</u> MA League of Women Voters 2018 Online Voting Guide. This includes all the candidates running in Massachusetts for district, county, state and federal positions this fall, and includes their positions on critical issues, such as the environment and climate change. GCFM 501(C)(3) Umbrella Status Renewal

Important: This form must be received by October 1, 2018

As a 501(C)(3) club under the Federation umbrella, you must submit a simple annual financial report together with any address or contact changes to the Federation by October 1 of each year.

To renew your 501(C)(3) status with the Federation you must:

Already be under the Federation umbrella.

Either use the renewal form below or send a letter to the Federation with the following information by October 1 of the current calendar year:

- Your club's EIN (Employee Identification Number looks like social security number)
- The name of a contact person who can answer financial questions, and that person's contact information.
- Any address or contact person changes from previous year.

A copy of the income and expense or profit and loss statement for the previous year (like taxes, you send it in for the year that has just passed). This statement should show what money has come into your club and from what sources, and what money has been spent and in what categories. This is <u>not</u> a copy of your checking account statement.

Clubs are required to file a 990N e-postcard with the IRS. Failure to file with the IRS will lead to the IRS removing you from the Federation's tax-exempt umbrella. If your club's gross income from projects, cash donations, dues, etc., is over \$50,000, you must file the IRS 990 EZ forms with the Federal Government. A copy of the filing must be included with the information you send to the Federation.

No filing fee is required.

GCFM 501(C)(3) Umbrella Status Application

Why this is important

If the IRS does *not* acknowledge you as a not-for-profit organization, you must pay taxes on your club's income and file state and federal tax returns each year. By being under GCFM's tax-exempt umbrella, you will be classified as a charitable group by the federal government.

As a 501(C)(3) organization, you can accept donations from corporations and individuals. They can in turn deduct these gifts from their income tax.

Special note: Becoming a tax-exempt organization is *not* the same as having a sales tax exemption from Massachusetts that allows you to purchase items without paying sales tax. You need to register with the Commonwealth of Massachusetts separately for sales-tax-exempt status. Go to the Mass Attorney General's website and click on "Charities" for more information. Once this is granted, you may apply to the Department of Revenue for a sales tax exemption.

How does a club become a 501(C)(3) under the

Federation umbrella?

First, your club must have its own EIN (Employee Identification Number), even though you have no employees. This number is required to obtain a club checking or a savings account. To acquire an EIN, you must file an SS-4 form. You may get this form online at irs.gov. When completed, the form can be faxed to 631-447-8960 or call 1-800-829-1040 and follow the menu for business employee identification numbers, and you can get it over the phone. We suggest you have a filled-in form in front of you when filing over the phone.

Your club may or may not be incorporated but cannot be a private foundation.

Your club must be a member of The Garden Club Federation of Massachusetts, Inc.

Your club's fiscal year must be the same as the Federation's (July 1 to June 30).

By October 1 of the current calendar year, you must submit the following completed information to the Federation:

A letter requesting to be included in the 501(C)(3) umbrella with the Federation, signed by a club officer.

A one-time filing fee of \$25 to cover expenses made out to "GCFM".

(This is not an annual fee; you pay it only when you first apply.)

The name and contact information, including phone number and email address, of someone who can answer questions about the club's finances.

A mailing address for the club. Although it is not mandatory, we suggest a post office box so the address will remain the same each year.

A one-page description/list of club activities.

A copy of your club's bylaws with the following two IRS clauses

included, <u>word for word.</u> These *must* already appear in the bylaws when applying.

<u>Dissolution Clause</u>: In the event of dissolution, all of the remaining assets and property of the organization shall, after payment of necessary expenses, be distributed to such organization as shall qualify under Section 501(C)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, or corresponding provisions of any subsequent Federal Tax Law or to the Federal Government, a State or Local government for public purpose, subject to the approval of a court of competent jurisdiction within the Commonwealth of Massachusetts.

Nondiscrimination Clause: The (Name) Garden Club shall not permit in their conduct of club affairs, any restriction or limitation whatsoever based upon race, color, creed, gender, and national origin or employment status

Financial information on your club:

- An income and expense or profit and loss statement for the previous year.
- A copy of a budget for the coming year.
- If a new club to the Federation, only current finances and proposed budget.

To maintain tax-exempt status under the GCFM umbrella, a club must submit an annual financial report with <u>any address or contact changes</u> by October 1 of each year AND file with the IRS.

Once you are under the umbrella, each year, you will need to file a 990N/e postcard information return with the IRS if your club's gross income is under \$50,000. You must file a 990EZ if over \$50.000. Gross income includes dues; revenue from sales and fund-raisers; monetary gifts given to the club; and income from CDs and other financial instruments. Income does not include non-financial gifts such as plants, labor, or materials.

If you *lose* your status by failing to file each year, getting back your tax-free status becomes expensive and difficult.
